

Bible verse of the week

#### Luke 10:25-37

<sup>25</sup> On one occasion an expert in the law stood up to test Jesus. "Teacher," he asked, "what must I do to inherit eternal life?" <sup>26</sup> "What is written in the Law?" he replied. "How do you read it?" <sup>27</sup> He answered, "'Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind; and, 'Love your neighbor as yourself."

<sup>28</sup> "You have answered correctly," Jesus replied. "Do this and you will live." <sup>29</sup> But he wanted to justify himself, so he asked Jesus, "And who is my neighbor?" <sup>30</sup> In reply Jesus said: "A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho, when he was attacked by robbers. They stripped him of his clothes, beat him and went away, leaving him half dead. <sup>31</sup> A priest happened to be going down the same road, and when he saw the man, he passed by on the other side. <sup>32</sup> So too, a Levite, when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side. <sup>33</sup> But a Samaritan, as he traveled, came where the man was; and when he saw him, he took pity on him. <sup>34</sup> He went to him and bandaged his wounds, pouring on oil and wine. Then he put the man on his own donkey, brought him



#### What's Your Story?

A couple of weeks ago, we talked about stories and how everyone loves to tell and to listen to stories of all types at all different times. We talked about what makes the best stories and said the best stories that really stick with us are the ones we can personally relate to as if it was being told about us.

That's what Jesus did when He told parables. Simple stories with important lessons that His listeners could relate to as if the stories were about them.

When we think about defending our faith we sometimes imagine a dramatic and intense back-and-forth debate or even a heated argument. But, that's not how Jesus did it. He told stories.

We agreed that Jesus is never a bad example to follow so instead of getting into arguments with people, consider telling a story.

We looked at an example of Jesus using a story to answer the "expert in the law" when he asked Jesus "who is my neighbor" when referring to loving your neighbor as yourself. The story we looked at is found in Luke 10:25-37 and is referred to as The Parable of the Good Samaritan.

Instead of Jesus trying to explain to His listeners who their neighbor is who should be loved as themselves, Jesus chose a story that they could easily understand and relate to and then allowed them to answer their own question.

We said that the characters in His story were very specifically chosen to speak directly to them and to show them that indeed everyone, even a Samaritan, is a neighbor who should be loved.

We said that our own faith story does not need to be dramatic or big or exciting. A simple and honest from the heart personal story about how Jesus made a difference in your life is all you need.

Next time you're having a deep conversation with your friend about what's important in life or your friend asks you why you go to Church every week, don't just give them an answer, answer them with your faith story and see what happens.

to an inn and took care of him. <sup>35</sup> The next day he took out two denarii and gave them to the innkeeper. 'Look after him,' he said, 'and when I return, I will reimburse you for any extra expense you may have." <sup>36</sup> "Which of these three do you think was a neighbor to the man who fell into the hands of robbers?" <sup>37</sup> The expert in the law replied, "The one who had mercy on him." Jesus told him, "Go and do likewise."

This weeks question: <u>A person used a verse from the Bible to argue</u> that Christians should not be "rich" and they should give away all their money to help the poor. The verse they used was Matthew 19:21 which is a verse, taken completely out of context, from the story of the Rich Young Ruler.

We looked at the one verse they used and agreed that, by itself, it does seem to say what the person said it did. But, it didn't make sense to us so we looked into it further.

We decided to take a look at the entire story inMatthew 19:16-26 to understand the context it was said in so we could understand the true meaning of what Jesus said.

We looked at the entire story and discussed it in depth and found that the story as a whole was not even about money or rich Christians at all. The problem with the Rich Young Ruler was not that he had money but that he placed his identity in his wealth and showed Jesus that he valued his wealth more than he valued God. Plus, his very first question, "what good thing must I do..." showed a self-reliance and lack of devotion to God. He was trying to save himself by his good works and by following God's law.

Jesus gives us the answer in the last verse when He tells His Disciples that with man this is impossible, but with God all things are possible.

Overall, this story is not about rich people not going to Heaven and Christians can't have a lot of money. What Jesus is really telling us through this story is that we can't save ourselves by works, it's impossible, it can't be done, don't even try, but God can, and will, save you.


